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LETTER FROM THE CO

Dear RESOLUTE families, friends, and loved ones,

Greetings from the Eastern Pacific Ocean. It seems like ages since we last saw one another back on November 27th, 2023. Since then, I can assure you, that your loved ones kept busy, proudly stood the watch, and capably weathered the litany of challenges presented during our deployment.

For those not familiar, our current mission is in support of the U.S. Government's strategic efforts to disrupt, intercept, and size narcotics at sea. Success can be measured in many forms, but when we prevent dangerous narcotics from reaching their intended destination(s), everyone wins...well everyone but the trafficking organizations. Over the span of RESOLUTE's 60-day patrol, your loved successfully interdicted 6,565lbs of Marijuana and 1,650kgs of Cocaine while detaining six suspected smugglers in two very complex cases. For our class of cutter (210' WMEC), that's a big haul, and one that everyone aboard and at home should be extremely proud of.

Your loved ones (my shipmates) are a resilient, resourceful, and hard-working crew dedicated to one another and deeply committed to executing our assigned missions in a safe and efficient manner. Like you, I could not be more proud of their many achievements throughout our deployment. During the patrol, RESOLUTE safely navigated over 8,500 nautical miles, conducted over 40 hours of flight operations, transited the Panama Canal (twice), had a swim call in over 9,000 feet of water, crossed the Equator four times (a significant milestone in a sailor's life at sea), visited Ecuador in South America, and landed a few Mahi Mahis, and a Sailfish during our fish calls – all around chasing narcotics traffickers in the vast Pacific Ocean. To say the least, we kept busy around conducting drills, training, and operations.

Patrols are never easy; this one was no different. I am fully aware your loved ones deployed over the holiday season. I cannot thank each of you enough for your sacrifice, support and well wishes during this period. I've often marveled at the phrase "it takes a village," in our case it is no different. We (RESOLUTE) cannot complete our work without your collective love and support. For that I offer you my most heartfelt thanks and assure you that we did our best to make the season as 'merry and bright' as we could despite missing all of you. We held a secret Santa gift exchange, had cookie decorating, sang carols, hung decorations around trivia nights, karaoke, and other special events (bingo), all spearheaded by RESOLUTE's crew. It was an honor to share this experience with your loved ones. Again, I cannot thank you enough for your support over this special time while considering all that you sacrificed on your end which allows us to do what we do on ours. We look forward to seeing you again soon, until then, keep a weathered eye on the horizon, and I wish each of you the best as RESOLUTE remains "Semper Paratus – Always Ready."

Your ongoing sacrifices and support have been instrumental in the successful completion of our missions—thank you! Amidst holidays, diverted port calls, repairs, drug interdictions, helo operations, and a dynamically changing mission, this patrol has been truly unique. Despite a busy patrol, the crew was able to enjoy some welldeserved rest and relaxation as RESOLUTE's crew appreciated a wonderful time sightseeing and enjoying the local culture in Panama City, Panama, as well as a unique and challenging stop in Manta, Ecuador. Completing a 60-day counter-narcotic patrol was demanding, yet rewarding as we seized 6,565 lbs of marijuana, and 1,680 kilos of cocaine. In addition, the crew underwent comprehensive training in damage control, aviation, medical procedures, detainee/migrant watch standing, engineering, and navigation, ensuring their proficiency and readiness for any situation. This training resulted in crew members obtaining 62 qualifications while conducting over 50 drills during this patrol. Whether dealing with a drug bust, training exercises, or simply standing the watch, the crew's professionalism and dedication to the mission were truly exceptional, particularly during the holiday season. As we return home and enjoy time with family, friends, and loved ones, the Chief's Mess extends heartfelt thanks to the crew for an outstanding patrol.


Sailor of the Quarter


Eight Bells Ceremony



ORDER OF THE DITCH!

After the five-day journey Petersburg, from St. RESOLUTE completed a 51mile, 7-hour transit of the Panama Canal. Sailors that transit the Panama Canal earn the "Order of the Ditch" certificate. The Panama Canal took 33 years to complete and was initially opened by the United States in 1914. The U.S. controlled until 1999. the canal Approximately 14,000 vessels transit the Panama Canal each year- RESOLUTE did it TWICE!









Patrol Operations






RESOLUTE interdicted two "go-fast" style vessels smuggling drugs through the Eastern Pacific Ocean. The crew seized 6,565 pounds of marijuana, 1,680 kilograms of cocaine, and apprehended 6 suspected narcotics traffickers. Our boarding teams, aviators, engineers, bridge teams, and combat information center all contributed to 2 successful cases. We proudly supported Joint Interagency Task Force South and U.S. Coast Guard strategic objectives to stop the illicit flow of narcotics from Central and South America.





Flight Operations




"NOW SET FLIGHT QUARTERS!"




